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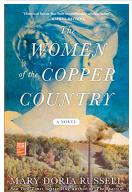
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Brandywine Book Club News

A Golf Pro Pointer and a Story

Pro Pointer: Left Sided Dominance For Right Handed Golfers

Of course left handed players should be focusing on right sided dominance.

We all know the conventional, proper golf swing uses both sides of the body equally, but in different ways. It's the left side that almost always collapses in a weak or poorly producing swing. Since the left-lead side creates the radius to a circle or arc of the swing, it's continuity cannot be compromised. The radius I refer to is also commonly called extension. TV viewers who watch Tour Events routinely hear commentators mention a player's

great extension. Good extension equals a repetitive and predictable swing pattern.

Beware, a taut left side does NOT translate to a STIFF left arm; a stiff left side will only lead to the infamous tennis elbow! The lead/left side is only anatomically straight.

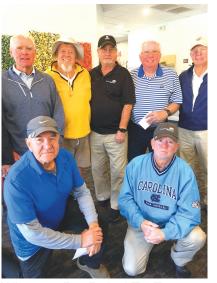

Here's an easy solution that really works!

 Empty the sink and run some hot water down the drain.



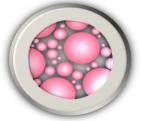
2. Pour 1 cup baking soda into the drain. Add a little at a time. You may have to poke it down with the end of a spoon to get it all in there.

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PetDocks Dental Care & Our Pets

The most common dental problem that we find in pets is far worse than cavities! It is periodontal disease. This disease affects the gums and other tissues around the teeth, instead of the teeth themselves.

About 75% of all dental problems serious enough to be seen by a veterinarian are the result of periodontal disease. It is also estimated that 75-80% of dogs and cats 3 years old or older have some degree of periodontal disease. It is the cause of 95% of all cases of "bad breath" and can result in infected, loose teeth, and often there is a loss of appetite due to painful gums.

Plaque builds up on the tooth surface and then becomes colonized with bacteria, eventually forming a hard, chalk-like tartar buildup that causes erosion of the gums and inflammation and infection of the tooth socket. The teeth then become loose and the gums become reddened, swollen, and bleed easily. This condition becomes very painful for your pet.

These bacteria may even enter the bloodstream through the inflamed gums and cause such problems as heart valve infections and kidney infections. Even signs such as diarrhea, vomiting and irritability may be the result of diseased teeth and gums.

Follow these tips for good oral hygiene for your pet:

- Most experts recommend at least once yearly professional cleanings. Some dogs and cats may require even more frequent cleanings.
- Feed at least some hard food to provide an abrasive cleaning action.
- Have your pet's teeth examined every 6 months for tartar buildup! Pets vary considerably in the amount of tartar that accumulates.
- Rub teeth and gums with a prescribed pet toothpaste or cleaning product once daily. A prescribed product especially formulated for pets is a necessity. Human toothpaste should not be used since it can be toxic if swallowed by the pet. A large selection of veterinary toothpastes, oral rinses, and gels are available.
- Pick nylon or rubber chew toys that will help keep the teeth clean. Avoid natural bones and antlers, which are hard enough to fracture teeth.
- When purchasing dental care products from a source other than your veterinarian, always look for the Veterinary Oral Health Council (VOHC) Seal of Approval

These recommendations will probably do more to prolong your pet's life and make it more enjoyable than anything else you can do. Proper dental care can add two years or more to the life of your pet!



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Spinach Dip with a Surprise

Do you like the idea of tricking your friends and family into eating tofu? Ha ha! Me too! If your crowd likes spinach dip, this is a good way to try to sneak in some tofu. I don't know much about tofu, but I did do some reading up on it in preparation for making this dip. The overall recommendation seems to be that the silken varieties are better for dips because they have a less-grainy texture.



The tofu I purchased was described as "firm silken," and it worked for this recipe. I used frozen spinach as instructed, but my original idea was actually to use cooked collards. Since that didn't work out for this batch, I may try it next time. Would I change anything else next time? Yes, I would reduce the garlic and increase the olives! Below is the original recipe I followed.

Ingredients:

10 oz frozen chopped spinach

1 package tofu (3/4 lb)

3 T olive oil

1/2 tsp black pepper

2 T vegetable bouillon granules

2 tsp dried basil

2 tsp garlic powder

1 T soy sauce

2 1/2 T lemon juice

1/2 large onion, finely minced

10-15 Kalamata olives, pitted and chopped

Directions:

- 1. Defrost spinach and remove as much of the liquid as possible
- 2. Drain tofu of excess liquid
- 3. In a large bowl, combine tofu and olive oil using a hand mixer until it's creamy-ish
- 4. Add pepper, bouillon, basil, garlic powder, soy sauce and lemon juice; mix on high speed until combined
 - 5. Add onion, spinach, and olives; mix in on low speed
 - 6. Cover and refrigerate for at least 8 hours
 - 7. Serve on crackers, bread or vegetables
