Water Concerns

Longtime residents of Brandywine surely remember it was not always this expensive to pay for services in Brandywine. For instance, a typical water and sewer bill in 2001, when we moved to Holly Lane, was approximately \$50. If last month is any indication of the new normal, a bill now is nearly triple that amount. It does not take an economist to agree that the cost for water and sewer services is clearly outpacing inflation. Why is Carolina Water Service, Inc. of North Carolina - Utilities, Inc. so expensive?

As we know, Carolina Water Service, Inc. of North Carolina - Utilities, Inc. is a monopoly. In our free-market system, sometimes monopolies are allowed. When it comes to utilities, monopolies are allowed largely due to efficiency reasons. Customers cannot simply choose a different service provider for water and sewer as easily as changing to a different internet provider. Instead one provider is allowed to serve an entire subdivision, like Brandywine.

In these cases where monopolies are allowed, customers are protected from unfair practices by appointed officials such as the North Carolina Utilities Commission (NCUC). These appointed individuals are charged with ensuring fairness, including setting the rates that utility companies can charge its customers (NC General Statutes § 62-130).

In determining the rate, the NCUC factors, among other things, a rate of return of 8.20%. That means after paying all their costs, Carolina Water Service, Inc. of North Carolina - Utilities, Inc. is guaranteed a return on their investments of at least 8.20% (NC Utilities Commission. Docket W-356 sub 336). On the surface, the rate of return itself is not a controversial item. Utility companies frequently need to pay for maintenance and upkeep. However, what may be controversial is that they are allowed to pay for expanding their market share by passing these capital costs to us the customer. In other words, we pay for Carolina Water Service, Inc. of North Carolina - Utilities, Inc.to acquire new businesses and grow and expand.

Recently in 2017, Carolina Water Service, Inc. of North Carolina - Utilities, Inc. was allowed an increase in the rate. They claimed in 2016, they were unable to earn their authorized rate of return. In order to earn this authorized rate of return, Brandywine residents going forward can expect an average increase of 20% in their monthly bill.

The time may be right for Brandywine residents to reverse this trend. On December 22, the president signed the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017. While the legislation allows for significant savings for individuals, corporations will also benefit tremendously under the new law. With the rate moving from 34% to a reduced flat rate of 21%, this will create a windfall for corporations, such as Carolina Water Service, Inc. of North Carolina - Utilities, Inc.

This presents Brandywine residents a rare opportunity. The time to act is now, because the good news is that, "The Commission shall from time to time as often as circumstances may require, change and revise or cause to be changed or revised any rates fixed by the Commission, or allowed to be charged by any public utility," (NC General Statutes § 62-130).

If you would like to get involved, write or call our representatives. They are there to serve us. They need to hear from concerned citizens. Carolina Water Service, Inc. of North Carolina - Utilities, Inc. would like nothing more than for Brandywine residents to quietly accept their rate hikes; and without your voice, the Commission will not act.

Call or write the Commission. Tell them, the new Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017 will create a windfall of additional revenue for Carolina Water Service, Inc. of North Carolina - Utilities, Inc., due to changes in the corporate tax rates. According to the NC General Statutes § 62-130 (d), we as Brandywine residents and customers of Carolina Water Service, Inc. of North Carolina - Utilities, Inc. respectfully request the Commission to review the rate base charged to its customers, and further request Carolina Water Service, Inc. of North Carolina - Utilities, Inc. to refund moneys to its customers which were over-collected from its customers, as per NC General Statutes § 62-130 (e).

Smart Energy Water (SEW) app: Coming this summer!

When the app is active, you can use it to check your bill status, view past bills, see your water usage, and more. You can also sign up to receive notifications via phone call, text, mobile phone call, and/or email. This includes notifications of line breaks and water flushes, as well as personalized notifications, such as when your household water usage has reached a certain threshold.

Charitable Giving:

Carolina Water wants to be involved in the community by partnering with local service groups. If your group is working on a park beautification, road cleanup, or other type of community service activity, contact Deb Clark to find out how Carolina Water can support your cause.

Suspected Leaks:

If you suspect a leak, please contact Carolina Water. There are several ways to identify a leak. First, check the average usage of water. If there is a spike in usage that continues, then Carolina Water can help you check for a leak. Second, if there is water at the meter or near the road, this is also a sign of a leak that Carolina Water can check. Finally, if your bill is unusually high, check around your home for leaks at the toilets, faucets, or crawl space.

Discolored Water:

Several residents reported experiencing discolored water during the February Quarterly BOA Meeting. One resident had previously requested water testing, and the water was tested at the well site and at the street level multiple times and was found to be clear. All of the state mandated tests show that our water is within all limits for chemicals and minerals. The sulfur smell is natural.

Residents who have a water softening device are encouraged to check the filters for debris and replace the filters. If the filters contain any debris and are not replaced, this will likely produce the color tint, due to the residue entering the home at this location.


If you have experience with another water system (such as Emerald Isle) that uses reverse osmosis, a process that removes so much iron and magnesium that the water system must INSERT minerals and ADD chemicals to address taste and how the water feels, then the water in our system will appear to have a faint tint.

Debit/Credit Card Payment Fee:

The fee is charged to address the costs associated with third party vendors when a bill payment is made online or via telephone with a debit or credit card. These fees cover the processing costs associated with handling credit card and electronic debit payments. No part of the convenience fee goes to CWSNC.

Duke Energy charges a fee as well; see their website for an example of their fee: https://www.duke-energy.com/home/billing/credit-card-debit-card-or-electroniccheck-payments. The Cape Fear Public Utility Authority also has a fee for debit/ credit card use.



PetDocks Maximizing Your Puppy's Happiness

Puppies learn and develop a big part of their adult personality by 16 weeks of age. If you want a happy dog that takes life in a joyous stride, start early. The associations that young dogs develop during this critical stage of brain development can last a lifetime ... for better or worse. Don't force things! Make sure these exposures are done in a way that's comfortable for the puppy. Don't keep exposing a puppy to a new experience if the dog is scared. As always, if you have questions, consult your veterinarian for best practices and general advice.

1. Handle your puppy – Make a point to touch your puppy all over. Don't ever be forceful or push to the point of struggle. Just touch and hold gently and reward his acceptance with a special treat. Remember, over time, you'll need to be able to trim toenails, clean ears and brush teeth. If your new puppy actually enjoys these rituals, life is better for you both.





- **2. Socialize with your puppy** Let your puppy meet people of all shapes, sizes and mannerisms to learn there's nothing to fear from people of all kinds. Don't force this if your puppy is fearful, ease into things. Introduce children, men and women, and even people with hats or costumes. Don't forget the treats to make "scary" fun!
- **3.** Play dress-up with your puppy If your dog is ever going to need a sweater or coat—or even a bandage—now's the time to teach him about them. Tie an adult T-shirt around him and let him get used to the feeling. Best of all, if you can help your new puppy learn about an E-collar—like those cones and collars the veterinarian will use when your dog recovers from surgery or illness—your veterinary team will really appreciate it. Your grown-up puppy won't be as freaked out when he needs to wear one.
- **4. Make noise with your puppy** Expose your pup to loud noises and novel objects, like the vacuum cleaner, the doorbell and even suddenly rattling a can with coins. Show that these things aren't harmful and reward her only when she's calm. Startling at a loud noise is typical, but your puppy can learn there's nothing to fear and recover quickly from a startle. Noise phobias are real, and you can do your part to prevent them.
- **5. Adventure with your puppy** You and your pup will experience all life has to offer together, but the experiences won't be as fun if your puppy is afraid or difficult to handle. Take your puppy everywhere you can for exposure to new places. Visit your veterinarian on a day just for a visit—and some friendly treats. Take the puppy on errands to see lots of new sights and smell new smells. Make all the places that you go extra special with great treats or repeat the visits until they're so normal that your pup is bored with them. It's easier for brains to remember bad experiences than good ones, so make sure your foundation for your puppy's brain is filled with terrific associations. You can avoid big problems in the future.

BOA Dues News

It is Brandywine Owners Association dues season. Here's what you need to know:

Dues notices will be mailed the last week of March, so you should receive them around April 1, 2018. The annual dues remain the same, at \$350 for the year.

Review your contact information on the enclosed gate card/clicker audit form. Note any changes to the information that are needed. The purpose of the gate card audit form is to ensure that only current residents and authorized users have active gate cards. All gate cards not accounted for in the audit will be disabled.

Owners of rental properties and renters should work together to ensure the gate card audit form includes the renters' information. Renters, contact Andy Haines directly if you want to confirm your contact information. He can be reached at ahainesnd@gmail.com.


Please return the form with your dues payment, even if you do not have any changes marked on the form.

Your dues and your gate card audit form are due on or before May 15, 2018. Use the enclosed green return envelope, which is addressed to 230 Brandywine Blvd., Morehead City, NC 28557. A \$20 late fee is due to the BOA for any dues submitted after the deadline.

Be aware that if you mail your dues from your mailbox or the Morehead City Post Office, it may take about 7 days for it to reach the mailbox at 230 Brandywine Blvd. Any dues that are postmarked May 15 or earlier will be accepted as "on-time."

You can also drop off your dues without postage in the mail box at the Hwy. 70 gate house. This is 230 Brandywine Blvd. The final collection of envelopes that will be considered "on-time" from this location will be at noon on

BOA Board Minutes:

Quarterly Meeting, February 12, 2018 at the K-Club

The meeting was called to order at 7:00pm at the K-Club. Board members present were, Andy Haines, Noreen Barrett, Bob White and Nancy Beszterczei. We had a guest speaker from Carolina Water, Deb Clark.

Deb Clark, Communications Coordinator with Carolina Water Service was our guest speaker to introduce her role to our neighborhood. She also answered questions. She can be reached at deb.clark@carolinawaterservicenc.com. The Carolina Water website is www. CarolinaWaterServiceNC.com, and the Brandywine-specific site is https://thebrandywinebay.com. You will be able to ask questions on the website. The Facebook and Twitter page is @carolinawaternc. Carolina Water is working to be proactive not reactive.

Carolina Water also wants to participate and be involved in any charitable giving. If we know of a project that they can help in any way please let Deb Clark know.

Later this summer there will be a smart water App – Smart Energy Water (SEW). The app will give detailed bill information about your water usage and alert you to any changes up or down from your normal usage. If you have a leak, the app will help you identify it before you get an outrageous bill. Basically this will be an instant notification system.

At 7:15, Noreen asked for a motion to accept the minutes as written from the January meeting. Andy made a motion to approve the minutes, Bob seconded. Minutes were unanimously approved. Rachel is away on business so Nancy Beszterczei graciously accepted the job to take the notes for the meeting.

Treasurer's Report: Bob White gave an overview of the treasurer's report stating we are currently under budget and have our money in CD's and Money Markets making money.

Annual Dues will be mailed out by March 23rd. The annual dues will remain the same at \$350 for the year. Payment must be made by May 15, 2018. Bob requested that payment be made as soon as you receive the notice to avoid any late charges. If you mail your payment realize it will take 7 days for it to reach our mailbox. Our mail is sorted in Morehead City, sent to Charlotte to be processed then sent back to Morehead City to be sorted then delivered. You can drop off your payment in the mailbox on the Highway 70 guard house and avoid the post office.

Secretary's report: None

OLD BUSINESS:

- 1. Insurance Renewal: Noreen is working with Tommy Bennett with the Insurance Center regarding our BOA Insurance Renewal. We paid \$5,600 last year plus \$800 for workman's comp insurance with another company. We just renewed our policy for \$4,300 with workman's comp being rolled into this policy at no charge when it comes up for renewal in September.
- 2. Drainage Update/ Road Maintenance: We are planning to clean the culverts and drainage ditches in the common areas this coming April. Residents are reminded to keep their own drains and culverts clean to help the drainage of the neighborhood. Carolina Water will be adding a driveway to the lift station at 304 Lord Granville as well as upgrading the culvert in this area. The driveway will allow them to get to their lift station without going on the golf course property. These improvements will be at Carolina Water's expense. We will be looking at the pot holes and general road conditions in the next few weeks to determine the necessary repairs.
- 3. Wilshire Commons: At the Planning Board meeting before the holidays, the Planning Board gave the developer a list of information that they needed to provide on this project (i.e. drainage, wetlands, etc.) before the board would take any further action. We have been checking in with the planning board periodically to see where things stand, and at this point, the developer has not submitted any of the requested information. The Planning Board also requested that the developer and the Brandywine Owners Association Board arrange a meeting to discuss community concerns and possible solutions/compromises, and the Board has been working to arrange that meeting. We will be continuing to monitor the status of the project, and will provide updates to the community as we learn more.

NEW BUSINESS:

- 1. Bridges Street Extension: There has been one public meeting at the Civic Center and we had a Brandywine only meeting with Board members and street reps discussing the four proposed routes. To date the route has not been chosen. Discussion about the highway 70 flooding issues and how the proposed routes can negatively impact the current issues was discussed and will be considered. Studies have been done as far as the current culverts. Our culvert is currently labeled marginal, meaning it is not in need of immediate repair or replacement, however in the event of another significant rain event with flooding on Hwy 70, the culvert will be replaced with a larger piping system. The project is estimated to be complete by 2024.
- 2. Upcoming BOA Dues and Gate Card Audit: We have decided to incorporate our gate card audit, phone directory updates and mailing our dues in ONE envelope. You will be receiving 2 papers by April 1st, one paper is the normal dues notice, the second page will have the owner/residents information populated. The gate cards and clickers will be listed as well as. Please read this carefully and update the information to keep our records accurate. If you rent your home, please update the renters' information appropriately. We will be deactivating any gate cards and clicker numbers that are not confirmed on the form. A green envelope will be provided to return your payment and the 2nd audit page.
- 3. Classification Fee for Lenders: Starting next month we will begin collecting a \$100 classification fee for the time we take preparing HOA letters for lenders. We spend a good amount of time gathering this information and the charge is common occurrence in many HOA's.

Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017: What Taxpayers Need to Know (Part 2)

On December 22, 2017, the President signed the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017 (the act or TCJA). The legislation makes significant changes to the Internal Revenue Code (IRC), including individual, corporate, and gift and estate taxation. We highlighted some of those major changes in our financial article last month, and there are several more changes we'd like to make you aware of that could be impactful.

Family tax credits. The child tax credit will be doubled, from \$1,000 to \$2,000, and the refundable portion of that credit will be allowable up to \$1,400. The act also will grant a new credit of \$500 for other dependents. These will phase out at income limits of \$200,000 (single) and \$400,000 (married).

Estate and gift taxes. Effective January 1, 2018, the individual unified gift and estate tax exemption will be raised to \$11.2 million (up from what was set to be \$5.6 million), and, with portability remaining intact, \$22.4 million for a married couple. The top rate will remain 40 percent. The new rates are set to expire—and return to 2017 levels—at the end of calendar year 2025.

Cash donations to charity. Under 2017 law, gifts of cash to charity offer a taxpayer the ability to deduct the contribution, up to 50 percent of AGI. The TCJA will increase the limitation to 60 percent of the taxpayer's AGI.

Education planning. The TCJA includes an expansion of 529 savings plans that will allow families to save for K-12 expenses, in addition to college expenses. 529 plans will also be able to use qualified distributions for elementary and secondary school expenses, up to \$10,000 per year, per student.

1031 exchanges. Beginning January 1, 2018, 1031 exchanges will be limited to

Affordable Care Act individual mandate. The TCJA will eliminate the penalty imposed under the IRC for individuals who do not maintain individual health care

Individual alternative minimum tax (AMT). The individual AMT exemption amount will increase to \$70,300 for individual filers and \$109,400 for joint filers. The By Marilyn Zmoda phase-out for the AMT exemption will increase to \$500,000 for individuals and \$1 million for married couples. With enactment of the new act, fewer Americans will be subject to the AMT.

Retirement recharacterizations. The TCJA will eliminate the ability for a taxpayer to unwind a Roth conversion and "recharacterize" back to a traditional IRA. This will begin for conversions occurring after January 1, 2018. Be sure to speak with your financial advisor before considering any new recharacterizations, as there is current debate as to whether Roth conversions that occurred in 2017 may still be characterized in 2018.

Pass-through business income. Under law in effect for the 2017 tax year, all pass-through business income is taxed at the individual taxpayer's marginal rate, as is most ordinary income. Under the TCJA, qualified pass-through business income will be addressed in a new IRC Section 199A as follows:

- Deduction of 20 percent of the non-wage allocation of qualified business income from the trade or business
- Deduction limited to 50 percent of W-2 wage income (The limitation was set in an effort to prevent abuse in classifying wage income as business income in order to receive a lower rate for income that should be taxed at ordinary income rates.):
 - For individuals: Income earned over \$157,000
 - For married couples: Income earned over \$315,000
 - Certain service professionals (e.g., attorneys, accountants, financial professionals) will be excluded from taking the deduction for income above \$157,000 for an individual and \$315,000 for a married couple.

Please note: The changes to pass-through business income taxation sunset at the end of calendar year 2025, as written in the TCJA.

Corporate taxation. Although the changes to how individual income is taxed are set to expire at the end of 2025, the corporate tax changes provided for in the TCJA will be permanent. One of the largest tax cuts in the legislation will lower the corporate tax rate from 35 percent to 21 percent, effective January 1, 2018. Furthermore, the TCJA will completely repeal the corporate AMT. The act will also impose some limitations on certain corporate tax deductions, including those for net operating loss, business interest, and R&D expenditures.

Assess where you are headed. In light of the sweeping changes, 2018 should result in a complete review of your financial snapshots. An overall review of income, assets, and balance sheet is important in order to get a clear picture of how the significant changes to individual income taxation will affect you and your family. More planning opportunities will continue to arise as the new tax code unfolds. Your financial advisor can answer your questions and provide educational resources to help navigate these changes. 



March Golf Tip

There are many golf phrases used by informed and uninformed instructors. Sometimes these comments are accurate, often they are not. These statements are correct as far as they go but are incomplete. This month I will address three common misstatements of golf instruction. Each month I will try to debunk many of the phrases often incorrectly applied to playing better golf.

First is the "inside to out" comment often recommended toward striking a golf ball correctly. It's true; we do strike the ball from inside out. However, it is imperative that the golf club shaft be inside AND parallel to our intended line during most of the swing. Very often I see golfers who are diligently following the plan of inside out



but are violating part B that includes being parallel. At about belt height in the backswing, our golf club should be parallel in two ways: to the ground and to the line. If you dropped the club, it would land in a line at your toes, parallel to the line of your shot.

Second is breaking wrists. There are two ways for us to break wrists during a golf swing. One is correct, and the other is decidedly not! Our wrists never flip, but they do cock. Think of the correct motion as a hammering action; we call it, "setting the angle." This is performed during the backswing. It is released to straight, our proper address position, during the downswing and cocks again well after impact. It is an effort to gain and release supplemental energy for the shot. Flipping wrists is not acceptable. There are many teaching aids sold to enhance the sense and look of this position sought by golf professionals and amateurs. A simple method is to insert a popsicle stick under your watch, left wrist for righties and right wrists for lefties. This forms a sort of splint. The idea is to totally restrict any flip of the wrist joint. Not only is the flip counterproductive, but it is a huge variable that translates into a wide range of bad shot types!

Third is the old, keep your left arm straight, (for righties, right arm for lefties). Look at pictures of top players; never do you see a straight, or locked elbow / lead arm. It is taut, not straight. Good athletes would never lock a joint unless they wanted to cause pain and injury to themselves! Our lead arm naturally hangs straight, and that's what we wish to preserve throughout the swing until the finish position.

Walking Amongst the Giants


In the fall we decided to explore the West Coast from Portland, Oregon to San Francisco, California. Our primary route would be the Pacific Coast Highway.




Portland is a fun, "small city". There is an extensive Farmer's Market on the weekends with literally hundreds of vendors. Most vendors are high-end artisans showcasing their hand-crafted items of turned wood, blown glass, jewelry, soaps, candles, etc. The city is easy to get around in and, if you're up for a little challenge, walking up the hills from the river will take you to Washington Park which houses a tea rose garden and a

Japanese Garden, among other things. Both are worth the hike. We logged 9.5 miles and 65 flights of stairs before stopping at Kell's Brewery for Bangers & Mash and a Pint to wash them down.

Driving from Portland to the PCH took us through a rainforest. The vegetation was lush and plenteous. Everything seemed bigger than what we would see at home. Oregon has a HUGE sand dune state park that the PCH runs through. The sand dunes rose up from the highway 50+ feet. There were signs for taking ATVS through the sand dunes and also "snowboarding" on the dunes. Next trip we're doing this!









But slightly inland, just south of the Oregon/California border is a route known as Avenue of the Giants. This was the most stunning and beautiful part of our trip. For 31 miles the road winds back and forth through Humboldt State Redwoods Park among some of the oldest, tallest and largest Redwood trees in the world. This is how the first inhabitants of California experienced the land. This is the beauty that prompted John Muir to petition for preservation of our natural resources and influence the establishment of the National Park System.

The Avenue of the Giants boasts trees that are over 950 years old. There are a few that have so much girth that a car can be driven through. With plenty of places to stop for picnicking, swimming, hiking, lodging or food, the drive could easily take all day or several days if you have the time.



We continued down the coast to Mendocino, California. There are no hotels in Mendocino, but Bed and Breakfast accommodations are plenteous and very charming. Lots of shops, restaurants, and art galleries as well as historical homes and small museums are packed into this tiny little

town. The town is known for is spectacular views and for whale watching from the shore during the migration season. The fans of Murder, She Wrote will feel like they have stepped into Cabot Cove, as this is where the shots of the homes and the town were filmed for the series.



Any opportunity to drive

along the West Coast, whether from San Diego north or Washington State south, is well worth the time. The coastline is so very different than the East Coast. The terrain and vegetation are extremely varied. The differences are so pronounced making you realize that the more you see, the more you realize you have yet to discover.


Water Heater Maintenance

"Oh no! The hot water is running out already?!" Does this sound familiar? That was happening to me, and I realized that our water heater is 8 years old, and we've never done any maintenance on it. Thanks, water heater, for working so well all this time even though we haven't given you the attention you deserve.

To help with my hot water woes, I called AA Express Plumbing. When Wesley arrived, I asked him if he would tell me about some basic water heater tips that I could share with the neighbors in Sound Waves. He agreed, and the following is what I learned from him. Note: We have a 40-gallon electric water heater, so this information applies only to similar types of units.

The general maintenance recommendation is to flush the hot water heater annually. This is just a matter of simply attaching a hose to the outlet at the bottom and opening the water heater's pressure relief valve, letting the water run out for five minutes. This should release any sediment that has collected at the bottom of the tank. Wesley suggests letting it run out over your driveway so you can see if the water is discolored. After five minutes, close the pressure relief valve. Remove the hose and clear away any debris from the drain valve. Your wa-



If you are experiencing your hot water running out sooner than usual, you may have either a heating element or a thermostat problem. Most electric water heaters have two heating elements and thermostats, a top and a bottom set. There are metal panels on the outside of your water heater that cover these parts. It is possible that sediment may have coated a heating element, causing it to work less effectively or burn out.

Today's water heaters usually have a maximum temperature setting of 140 degrees, however the factory recommended setting is usually 125 degrees, to reduce the risk of scalding. If you wish to change your water heater's setting, remove the metal panels and adjust the temperature knobs. The setting should be the same for both the top and bottom elements. Increasing the temperature may also help prevent your hot water from running out too quickly.

Finally, keep in mind that cold weather affects the hot water that is delivered to your faucet. The water entering the water heater is colder, so it takes more time to warm up to the desired temperature. Also, if your water lines are not insulated, warm water cools in the lines and needs to be pushed through your faucet before the hot water is delivered.

These factors, plus a few extra minutes in the shower, can deplete your hot water tank more quickly. So, what do you think? Should water heater maintenance be on your list of spring cleaning activities?

Another Water Heater Tip

Aside from the thermostat and the heater elements, another important water heater part is the anode rod. Water heaters are made with an anode rod inside to prevent rust from destroying your water tank. The anode rod attracts the corrosive minerals, so it becomes the victim, rather than the metal tank. If you are experiencing discolored water or water that smells funny, check your anode rod. Using a water softener can help prevent sediment build-up and corrosion in your water heater; however, over-softening can cause the anode rod to corrode more quickly.

How Much is a Porch Worth?

When looking to purchase a home, most potential buyers will specify to their REALTOR® or on line search how many bedrooms they need, but rarely do we hear porch requirements. However, when the previews start, it's often the porch that seals the deal. When I personally designed my home I started with the big screened porch facing the canal. That porch is the center of my families' activities, meals, kayak watching, morning coffee, reading and just watching the dogs and grandchildren in the back yard.

Would Tara be as appealing without the porch? I don't think so. Here in the South, outdoor living space is very important. With the moderate weather we enjoy here at the Crystal Coast, a porch can be utilized at least six months of the year. The porch, whether a back porch or a front porch extends the living space and adds a gracious southern touch to any home.

A stoop is not a porch. A porch must be at least big enough to accommodate a couple of rockers, but ideally a dining table should also fit nicely. Some porches have unfinished wood floors and outdoor finishes. Some have tile floors and finishes as nice as found inside. Some are screened and some are not. Some even have heaters or fireplaces to extend the time of use.

If you're thinking of selling your home, don't ignore the porch. Renovating the porch can definitely boost its chance of selling. It adds value to the house and makes it more saleable. If you can't renovate the porch, spruce it up. Make it as clean and uncluttered as the rest of the house. Stain or paint and add some pretty bright colored cushions.

Nationwide, 65 % of new homes being built in 2016 included a front porch. (I can't find statistics that include back porches.) No surprise, that percentage is even higher in the Southeast at 85%. If you don't already have a front porch, you may want to examine the possibility of adding one. How much is a porch worth? We can't yet be sure, but I'd guess, PRICELESS.

What am I getting into?



Tax Scam Warning Reminder

Thousands of people have lost millions of dollars and their personal information to tax scams. Scammers use the regular mail, telephone, or email to set up individuals, businesses, payroll and tax professionals.

The IRS doesn't initiate contact with taxpayers by email, text messages or social media channels to request personal or financial information. Recognize the telltale signs of a scam.

IRS-IMPERSONATION TELEPHONE SCAMS

A sophisticated phone scam targeting taxpayers, including recent immigrants, has been making the rounds throughout the country. Callers claim to be IRS employees, using fake names and bogus IRS identification badge numbers. They may know a lot about their targets, and they usually alter the caller ID to make it look like the IRS is calling.

Victims are told they owe money to the IRS and it must be paid promptly through a gift card or wire transfer. Victims may be threatened with arrest, deportation or suspension of a business or driver's license. In many cases, the caller becomes hostile and insulting. Victims may be told they have a refund due to try to trick them into sharing private information. If the phone isn't answered, the scammers often leave an "urgent" callback request.

Some thieves have used video relay services (VRS) to try to scam deaf and hard of hearing individuals. Taxpayers are urged not trust calls just because they are made through VRS, as interpreters don't screen calls for validity.

Limited English Proficiency victims are often approached in their native language, threatened with deportation, police arrest and license revocation, among other things. IRS urges all taxpayers caution before paying unexpected tax bills. Note that the IRS doesn't:

- Call to demand immediate payment using a specific payment method such as a prepaid debit card, gift card or wire transfer. Generally, the IRS will first mail you a bill if you owe any taxes.
- Threaten to bring in local police or other law-enforcement groups to have you arrested for not paying.
- Demand payment without giving you the opportunity to question or appeal the amount they say you owe.
- Ask for credit or debit card numbers over the phone.

TAX ASSISTANCE AVAILABLE

The AARP Foundation's Tax-Aide Program offers free federal and state income tax return preparation and electronic filing for seniors and low-to-moderate income taxpayers. Membership in AARP is not required for either volunteers or the taxpayers who utilize the program. Tax preparation services begin Feb. 1 and end April 18.

Volunteers go through training and are IRS certified to prepare returns at the sites listed below.

A Guide To Brandywine Bay Covenants

From the BOA website – http://brandywineowners.org/homeowners/boa-committees/

To assist you, the following is an outline of the most common questions concerning the Brandywine Covenants.

FENCES: Maximum allowable height is 60 inches (5 feet), to be installed from the rear corner of the house to the side property line ONLY. If bordering the golf course an opening for ingress or egress is a must. Request must be submitted in writing indicating location and the type of fence requested. Prior approval required.

GAS TANKS: Maximum allowable outside tank is 50 gallons and must be screened with either large shrubs or material to match house. Gas tanks larger than 50 gallons must be buried in the ground.

CLOTHES LINES: Prohibited.

BURNING OF TRASH, LIMBS, ETC: Prohibited.

HVAC: Must be screened by large plants or material matching house.

ANTENNA (RADIO/TV): The following are not allowed: ham radio towers, TV antennas or large satellite dishes. Small satellite dishes are acceptable with prior approval of location.

DRAINAGE/DRIVEWAY: A 15-inch culvert minimum is required for all driveways.

IRRIGATION SYSTEMS: No prior approval is required.

BOATS/TRAILERS/CAMPERS: Prohibited on any property for longer than one (1) week, this applies to all size boats and trailers. A private storage area is available at a small fee. For access to the area call the Boat Storage Coordinator.*

HOME/LOT APPEARANCE: All changes in the outside appearance of your home or lot (paint, deck, screened porches, tree removal, roofing, etc) must have prior approval. All lots must be well maintained. No rubbish or trash is permitted to remain on any lot.

DETACHED STRUCTURE: No shed, tent, shack, barn, storage units or other outside buildings shall be erected on any property.

PETS: House pets shall be on leash when off the premise of the owner; this includes dogs and cats. Owners must pick up the solid waste of their pets when off their own property.

SIGNS: Only "For Sale" or "For Rent" signs are permitted on the property and shall not exceed 2 feet by 2 feet. By Amendment dated November 28, 2005 "sand blasted" signs are no longer a requirement. SIGNS ARE NOT PERMITTED AT EN-TRANCES OR ALONG STREETS, INDICATING" open house," "garage sale," "yard sale," etc.


